ANSEAUME, Nicolas

Léry, Normandie 1730 – Paris 1786

Nicolas Anseume [Ansiaume, Ansiome, etc.], who died in Paris in 1786, was said to be a pupil of La Tour by the owners of the Messier portrait (a later chalk drawing of the astronomer by Ansiaume also exists), a suggestion supported by the terms of La Tour's first testament of 20.X.1768: "M^{rs} Restout, Montjoye, Ensiaume partageront mes crayons de pastels et couleurs et toutes mes études qui ne seront pas sous verre ou glace et qui ne sont pas collez sur des cartons ou des toiles". The hand appears to be the same as that of the "Ansionce" who provides some biographical information on the back of the pastel of an unknown woman some 10 years earlier. This allows us to identify him as the Nicolas Anseume born 20.V., baptised 21.V.1730 at Léry, the son of César and his wife Anne Védi (the parrain, Pierre Anseume, was illiterate). He is described somewhat imaginatively as "peintre de l'Académie royale" in the document published by Guiffrey. According to this, Ansiaume was a peintre en pastel, living in the rue de Richelieu, à l'hôtel des Deux-Siciles (confirmed by a partage des biens, 29.XI.1786, AN MC XXVIII/524; inv. p.m. carried out by Paillet, 20.IX.1786, AN MC XXVIII/523). The inventory included "tableaux au pastel de fruits, portraits, têtes de fantaisie études de têtes au pastel certains d'après Rosalba", as well as portfolios of prints, mannequins, an easel and other tools. In 1785 the pastellist Boze recorded a debt of 624 livres to Ansiaume for the hire of a mannequin used in his portrait of Louis XVI. Anseume left some 5680 livres in cash and a valuable library; his heirs included the children of the maître-doreur Pierre Allais (often confused with the pastellist Jacques-Charles Allais *q.n.*), whose widow was born Marie-Françoise Ansiaume (Nicolas Ansiome, peintre was godfather to Pierre-Nicolas Benjamin, son of Antoine Allais, according to the records at Saint-Sulpice, 9.IV.1784). Guiffrey thought Anseume was nothing more than a painter of mannequins, but we now know better. A miniature *Ruine d'architecture* painted by "le sieur Anteume" was in the inventaire de l'Académie de Saint-Luc on its dissolution and could be another product of this obscure artist.
