BERTRAND, Guillaume

Paris c.1740–p.1800

Bertrand was a pupil of Carle Van Loo (at the same time as Robert West) and of Noël Hallé. He went to London, exhibiting at the Free Society in 1764 from Mr Eldridge's, Cecil Street in the Strand, before moving on to Dublin where he opened a drawing school on Arran Quay according to a newspaper advertisement of 17.XII.1765. He exhibited portraits in oil and crayon at the Society of Artists in Dublin from 1765 to 1770. Despite winning prizes from the Dublin Society in 1766 for the best full-length portrait (£11 7s. 6d) and the best original engraving, he does not seem to have been particularly successful. He had returned to Paris by 1770 (his Dublin exhibits were sent from Arran Quay until 1768; no address is given for 1769, while his final exhibits in 1770 were sent from Paris), exhibiting at the Salons from 1791 to 1800. Two pastels from the 1795 Salon were sent from Marché-Palu, près le petit Pont, no. 9. Guillaume Bertrand, "ancien professeur à Dublin, artiste peintre à Paris" was, with Bosio, Laperche and eight others, a candidate to succeed the draughtsman Charles-Édouard Chaise at the école de Fontainebleau in 1798; Moitte was appointed by the committee, which included David, Vien and Vincent.
