DAHL, Michael

Stockholm 1659 – London 1743

The Swedish portrait painter travelled in France, Italy and Germany with Henry Tilson (*q.v.*) before settling in London in 1688. His will was made 1735 but proved in London on 20.X.1743: his son, also Michael (who predeceased his father), was to receive all his “prints, books drawings and all other things which belong to my business of painting”, while his daughters Dorothy and Catherine were to receive his household effects. His history pictures were to be sold by “cantor auction”, but his portraits were to be sold privately. A number of fine chalk drawings are known (e.g. in the British Museum) but only one pastel has so far emerged. Although apparently signed its technique seems rather different, but it may belong to a later period of his long career.
