GRIGNION, Charles II

London bpt 30.XII.1753 – Leghorn 4.XI.1804 Portraitist and history painter. He was baptised at St Paul, Covent Garden, the son of Thomas Grignion, a Huguenot watchmaker, and nephew of the engraver, also Charles Grignion or Grignon (1716-1810), who engraved a pastel by Pond (Anson, 1744). Charles II won prizes at the Society of Arts in 1764 and 1768 before enrolling as a student at the Royal Academy on 9.VIII.1769 (aged 17); he was also a pupil of Cipriani. In 1776 he won the Royal Academy's gold medal and in 1781 he took up a three year travelling scholarship to Rome. He was to remain in Italy for the rest of his life, working not only as a painter but also as a dealer and guide for grand tourists. The British Museum sheet seems to be in black chalk with only blue pastel used to colour the uniform.
