Sir James Jefferyes [Jeffries, Jeffreys, etc.] (1635–p.1713), captain in the guards of Jan III Sobieski, brigadier-general in the English service under Queen Anne, Governor of Duncannon Fort, then of Cork 1698, cr. Kt Cracow 1676, prisoner at Poltava ∞ 1° Mlle Vandenenden, of Sweden (-1685); 2° Catherina Dranchentulin, of Sweden
